Nature Park

- This is not a park that will require large development or maintenance costs.
- This is a unique opportunity to have a large, centrally located, intact riverfront area easily accessible to the citizens of Prince George.
- Council has recognized the need to do more with riverfront areas.
- The potential of this area has been recognized in OCPs.
- Wildlife habitat suitability is high.

Birdsong Park is a large intact riverside natural area with habitat for birds and urban wildlife that should not be developed.

Habitat

Five hundred habitat shrubs were planted by volunteers in the cleared portion of the land to expand specific habitat area. Over 3000 trees and shrubs have been planted, for habitat enhancement, visual screening and sound buffering. **Improvements funded by Pittman.**

During the summer of 2020 residential wildlife included:

- A doe mule deer & fawn
- Two yearling mule deer with two point antlers
- Cow moose & calf
- Two year old black bear
- Coyote

These animals were resident in the park for several months over the spring, summer and fall.

Other Improvements

To date improvements have been mostly been done by volunteers with supporting funds from Pittman Asphalt. For example;

- nesting and rearing periods to confirm habitat use.
- Trail networks have been re-designed and signed to avoid developed areas.
- An osprey pole was erected by volunteers.

An assessment of bird habitat suitability was completed by TDB **Consulting on a pro-bono basis.** Bird call recordings were taken during

An accessible riverbank trail is planned, subject to city endorsement.

We request a motion to rezone the city property to a P1 park
