- 2) Ensure developers complete affordable housing options For students, seniors and low income community members


Ecological Services

The Value of an Aesthetically-Pleasing Greenspace

Feeding Wildlife in Cottonwood Park

Background Information:

- When experiencing nature, individuals prefer more pristine environments (Ibarra et al, 2017; Karden et al, 2015)
- Greenspace positively impacts mental health, and interventions aimed at improving psychological functioning through the use of green spaces are particularly successful in treating mental illness (Louv, 2005; Epstein et al., 2006; Davis & Atkins, 2004; Wilson et al., 2008; Allen, 2007).
- Exposure to biodiverse, aesthetically-pleasing greenspace is beneficial to the cognition of adolescents and adults. (Gunnarsson et al., 2016; Joye et al., 2018; Maes et al., 2021)
- Unique greenspaces are profitable through tourism (Flanagan, 2011; D'Souza, 2021; Government of Manitoba, 2017).

Issues:

- Disturbed and compromised aesthetic
- Duck population staying through the winter (not migrating)
- Dangerous animal attractant
- Garbage Bears


Recommendations:


- Bylaw officers enforcing Prince
