



MEASURES OF SUCCESS

- 10 percent of the population has been informed of the OCP Review
- 6 percent of the population has participated in the OCP Review (1,000 touch points)
- Input has been collected through a wide variety of events and platforms
- Input gathered through the engagement process represents a wide range of perspectives that reflect Prince George's socio-economic diversity
- Input gathered reflects the perspectives of all ages and abilities
- The City's relationships with Lheidli T'enneh First Nation and Urban Indigenous groups have been strengthened through regular communication and meaningful engagement

68 radio ads over 8 days




50 posters distributed

3 pop-up booths








DEMOGRAPHICS - SURVEY

What region of Prince George do you live in?








DEMOGRAPHICS - SURVEY

What age group do you belong to?








ROUNDTABLE DISCUSSIONS

- We heard from the following community groups:
 - Arts and Culture Groups (12)
 - Environmental Groups (16)
 - Business and Development Groups (19)
 - Community Organizations (7)
- Invitations were sent to 114 community groups
- A total of 39 community groups were represented

- 1 Community Open House: October 17, 2023
- Hosted at the Two Rivers Gallery
- ~176 community members
- Ginters Green Forever were well represented

- Growth, density, built form and housing








COMMUNITY PRIORITIES

What are your top priorities for the OCP Review?








REPORT CARD

OCP OPPORTUNITIES


- What is the greatest opportunity the OCP Review presents for Prince George?
 - The opportunity for the community to have their say (53 comments)
 - Protecting greenspace including parks, forests, wildlife corridors and specific outdoor sites such as Ginters Green (48 comments)
 - Improving and expanding transportation (40 comments)
 - Planning for the future (37 comments)
 - Reducing sprawl and increasing density (31 comments)





VISION FOR THE CITY

- Prince George is a City...
 - That preserves and values nature and greenspace
 - With effective transit and active transportation
 - With diverse and affordable housing
 - That is inclusive, safe, accessible, and diverse







THINGS TO AVOID

- What should we avoid as Prince George grows to 2050?
 - Avoid losing or damaging greenspace
 - Avoid sprawl
 - Address ongoing homelessness
 - Lessen dependence on cars








COMMUNITY MAPPING EXERCISE

- Protect
 - green areas from development and sprawl
- Remove
 - fire risk to the community and trains from downtown
- Improve
 - trails, parks, community facilities and transit
 - housing for seniors and access to the waterfront
 - hospital (especially parking areas)
 - increase density along 15th Avenue

 - Transit-Oriented Development (TOD)




