Site Safety

- 24/7 staffing by experienced professionals
- Direct phone number shared with neighbours
- Regular property maintenance and cleaning
- Perimeter checks
- All BC Housing projects employ **Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED):**
 - Maximizing views of parking areas, entrances, sidewalks and other public spaces
 - Security cameras and lighting
 - Fencing, gates and fob entry





Community Safety

- Community safety is a collective effort and responsibility
- BC Housing provides **safe, affordable and quality housing** for people living in B.C.
- We also want a safe community and are **committed to being a good neighbour**.
- For safety concerns or issues beyond our housing sites, BC Housing works collaboratively with municipalities (bylaw), law enforcement and/or other emergency services for whom public safety is their mandate.
- BC Housing also supports our non-profit operators to work directly with the community to address any concerns that may arise around our projects.





Resident Selection via Coordinated Access & Assessment

- Eligible clients are matched to housing and supports, supportive housing and rent supplements funded by BC Housing
- Clients are supported to complete common triage and intake tools, including the Supportive Housing Registry (SHR) application form and the Vulnerability Assessment Tool (VAT).
- Available housing-related resources are matched to clients based on vulnerability and need, balanced with the need to also create healthy communities within the housing sites.
- Process is enhanced by the collective knowledge and existing relationships among service providers and with clients in the community.
- Provincial standards apply, regional and community differences and adjustments are permitted for operational and emergency responses, and to meet the needs of the local homelessness response



COORDINATED ACCESS & ASSESSMENT

CAA is a...

- Client-focused approach
- Single point of access: single application form
- Common assessment tool: common language
- Appropriate matching of client to supportive housing
- Coordinated access to housing: less fragmentation
