Recommendation(s):

That the Committee of the Whole RECOMMENDS that Council approve the 2026–2027 Limited Duration Operating Grant funding allocations, in the amount of \$131,576 as outlined in the report dated February 17, 2026, from the Director of Civic Facilities and Events, titled “Limited Duration Operating Grant Proposed Recommendations Summary 2026”.

Purpose:

This report, along with the attached Summary Report, provides the Committee of the Whole with an overview of the applications received during the 2026 annual intake of the Limited Duration Operating Grant. It also presents proposed funding allocations for the Committee’s consideration and recommendation to Council.

Background:

In January 2025, Council approved the introduction of a Limited Duration Operating Grant (LDOG) to provide operational funding to not-for-profit organizations. In alignment with the Council Policy on Multiyear Funding, new operational and/or multiyear funding requests are reviewed through the LDOG process.

Following the 2025 pilot year, administration identified several challenges and opportunities to improve program effectiveness, alignment, and administrative efficiency. Based on these findings and with approval from Council, the LDOG criteria and delivery approach were refined for 2026 as follows:

- Council identified two priority focus areas to ensure alignment with community priorities
 - A safe, healthy and clean community
 - equity, diversity, inclusion and accessibility
- Eligibility is limited to organizations that:
 - have an operating budget of less than \$250,000 (supporting smaller not-for-profits to build local capacity ensures a more equitable and diverse delivery of community services, strengthening overall community resilience)
 - directly impact over 100 residents annually through programs or services
 - offer programming and services on a daily, weekly, monthly, or seasonal basis

- demonstrate partnership with at least one other organization on an ongoing basis
 - Do NOT have a low-cost or subsidized lease agreement with the City of Prince George
 - Do NOT have a Standing Grant Agreement
- A Letter of Intent (LOI) stage was introduced to improve efficiency around initial screening.
 - A preference to fund the full amount requested with an anticipated 5-8 applicants funded

A more detailed analysis of Year 2 of the Limited Duration Operating Grant (LDOG) pilot will be included in the annual review of the Community Grants Program later this fall. However, a key consideration relevant to the review of the 2026 LDOG applications was the variability in the consistency and quality of financial documentation submitted, which made it challenging to conduct assessments in a consistent manner. In response to this challenge, staff refined the assessment approach to ensure fairness in adjudication. Looking ahead to the 2027 intake, administration will seek Council direction on options to further refine and streamline this grant stream, with the objective of maintaining an equitable and transparent application process while reducing administrative complexity for both applicants and staff.

Discussion:

Limited Duration Operating Grant Application Review 2026

The City received a total of 26 applications. Of these:

- 4 applications did not meet grant criteria and eligibility requirements at the Letter of Intent (LOI) stage.
- 2 applicants did not proceed to submit a full application following invitation after LOI approval.

This resulted in 20 full applications being assessed. An external review team was convened to assess the 2026 Operating Grant applications. The adjudication process followed the MyPG framework. An interagency working group—comprised of two City staff members and three representatives from the funders' collaboration—reviewed applications for eligibility and alignment with the grant criteria using the LDOG scoring matrix. Applications were evaluated based on:

- Alignment of organizational mandates and operations with the prioritized grant criteria
- Overview of programs and services, including target audience, participant numbers, and community impact
- Nature and relevance of community partnerships
- Rationale for requesting operating funding, including revenue trends, changes in service demand, and diversity of funding sources

The 2026 Limited Duration Operating Grant was oversubscribed by \$1,510,383.25, with funding requests far exceeding the available budget. Of the twenty applications reviewed, fifteen organizations were recommended for funding; five applications were not recommended for funding but remain eligible to apply for other City grant streams, including the myPG Community Grant and Quick Response Micro Grant.

The proposed funding allocations are presented to the Committee of the Whole. Under the multiyear policy (Limited Duration Operating Grant stream), funding allocations are provided for a two-year term to all successful applicants.

Strategic Priorities:

The Community Grants Program, including the limited duration operating grant stream, aligns with the 2023-2026 Strategic Plan's priority of social health and well-being by ensuring effective and efficient delivery of diverse community programs, activities and services.

Summary and conclusion:

This report summarizes the applications received for the 2026 intake of the Limited Duration Operating Grant. Administration recommends that the Committee of the Whole bring forward a recommendation to Council to approve the 2026–2027 Limited Duration Operating Grant funding allocations, as detailed in the table above, in the total amount of \$131,576 to fifteen organizations under this funding stream. The recommended allocations provide the same annual funding amount to each approved organization in both 2026 and 2027, consistent with the two-year term of this grant stream.

COUNCIL POLICY

POLICY NAME: Multiyear Funding Grants (Standing Grants and Limited Duration Operating Grants)

CATEGORY: CITY GOVERNMENT AND INFRASTRUCTURE
APPROVED BY COUNCIL: October 7, 2024
DEPARTMENT RESPONSIBLE: Civic Facilities & Events

1. PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to establish a transparent and consistent approach to managing existing and new requests for multiyear funding grants.

Multiyear funding grants support organizations in advancing the City of Prince George's vision, mission, and strategic priorities, including:

- city government and infrastructure,
- economic diversity and growth,
- social health and well-being, and
- environmental stewardship and climate action.

The implementation of this policy includes an oversight role for Council. Through the *Committee of the Whole*, multiyear funding requests will be received, reviewed and recommended. All final funding and agreement approvals are provided by Council.

2. POLICY STATEMENTS

1. This policy includes a governance role for Council, however there is no obligation on the part of Council to commit to multiyear funding.
2. A multiyear funding grant provides on-going financial support (up to 4 years for existing agreement/standing grants and up to 2 years for new agreements/limited duration grants) to a not-for-profit organization that has demonstrated sustainable and diverse financial resources and has established a successful long-term service to the community. It covers operational costs or regular programs, offering stable and consistent funding compared to one-time grants.
3. The organization must be a registered society or charity. (Evidence obtained through the Canada Revenue Agency or BC Registry Services, of its good standing as a registered society or charity).
4. The City utilizes multiyear funding as a cost-effective strategy to enhance municipal services or support the provision of quality-of-life programs and services for residents. Unlike one-time grants (such as a myPG grant), it offers consistent funding over a determined timeframe. This

type of grant is often used to support long-term projects, cover operational costs, or fund regular programs/services, giving recipients (not-for-profit organizations) stability and predictability.

5. Existing/standing grants will be considered according to the process outlined in this policy and the Administrative Procedure.
6. New multiyear funding requests will be considered through the limited duration operating grant process (a grant stream offered through the Community Grants Program).
7. The level of available funding for multiyear funding will be accounted for in the annual operating budget process and is subject to approval by Council.

3. POLICY ADMINISTRATION

MULTIYEAR FUNDING PROCESS

STREAM A: Existing Agreements/Standing Grants

1. Reporting

- Reporting responsibilities will be outlined in the funding agreement.
- The organization will be expected to deliver a report and/or presentation to Council.
- Includes option to request additional funding
- The organization should acknowledge on a regular and consistent basis, the financial contribution from the City of Prince George.

2. Review and Decision Making

- The *Committee of the Whole* completes a review of reporting, submitted by the organization. Organizations may be able to utilize reporting formats provided to other Funders (such as provincial or federal reporting templates) to fulfill City reporting. Other considerations may include:
 - Community impact and alignment with Council's strategic priorities
 - Budget efficiency and value for investment
 - Adherence with grant funding objectives, and other considerations in the funding agreement

3. Approval

- Council will receive a summary report from the *Committee of the Whole* and provide final approval, including the recommended funding for the duration of the multiyear funding service agreement term.

4. Implementation and Follow-Up

- Administration will complete and implement the multiyear funding agreements for the designated term.

STREAM B: New Applicants – Limited Duration Operating Grants

1. Apply

- Applicants submit a grant application. New applications will be managed through the Limited Duration Operating Grant, a grant stream included in the Community Grants Program.
- Detailed guidelines on how to apply, including eligibility criteria, required documentation, and assessment criteria will be provided as part of the community grants program available on the city grants webpage.

2. Preliminary Screening

- Administration will review applications for completeness (alignment with Council’s strategic priorities, community impact and adherence with funding objectives, eligibility criteria and other considerations.)
- Administration will provide a summary of proposed recommendations for adjudication to the *Committee of the Whole*

3. Review and Decision Making

- A summary of the proposed recommendations will be presented to the *Committee of the Whole* for their review. Administration will arrange for presentations to the *Committee of the Whole* by applicants as necessary.

4. Approval

- Council will receive a summary report from the *Committee of the Whole* and provide final approval for all applications, including confirming the recommended funding for the duration of the agreement term.

5. Implementation and Follow-Up

- Administration will complete and implement the multiyear funding agreements for the designated term.

6. Reporting

- Throughout the grant term, community organizations will complete reporting requirements included in the funding agreement. Additionally, they may be requested to deliver annual presentations to Council.
- The organization should acknowledge on a regular and consistent basis, the financial contribution from the City of Prince George.

DURATION OF MULTIYEAR FUNDING

- Standing grants may be up to a maximum of 4 years, subject to annual reporting and renewal.
- Limited duration operating grants may be up to a maximum of 2 years, subject to annual reporting and renewal.
- Organizations may reapply for both standing grants and limited duration operating grants at the expiry of the current term.

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Specific roles of Council and City Administration include the following:

- **Council Members**

- a) Review reporting and applications and provide final approval on all funding agreements and amounts.

- b) As per the Sustainable Finance Policy, identify the level of funding to support multiyear funding agreements through the City’s annual budget process.
- c) Review the multiyear funding grant process to provide input (which may result in amendments to the Council Policy and consequential amendments to the Administrative Procedure).

- **City Administration**

- a) The Director of Civic Facilities & Events and/or their designate is authorized to administer and/or manage the grant process, and to develop, establish, implement, and maintain the grant guidelines including any amendments.
- b) The City Manager is authorized to approve Administrative Procedures to support this Council Policy.
- c) Ensures multiyear funding agreements are established within a timely manner to provide for uninterrupted delivery of services.
- d) Supports Council via *Committee of the Whole* with any necessary pre-work (review all applications for completeness and adherence with funding objectives, eligibility criteria and other considerations such as alignment with Council’s strategic priorities and community impact etc.)
- e) Prepares and provide a summary of the proposed recommendations to the *Committee of the Whole* and arranges for presentations to the *Committee of the Whole* by applicants as necessary.
- f) Provides Council with an annual update on the multiyear funding grant process.

CONDITIONS OF FUNDING

- Funds must be used for the purpose for which they were approved. If the originally intended purpose cannot be carried out, applicants should contact the City as soon as possible to inform of the situation and discuss options.
- Mismanagement of grant funds may require the organization to return the funds and may lead to ineligibility for future multiyear grants, at the City's discretion.

GRANT COMMUNICATIONS

- Information on the Community Grants Program, including options for multiyear funding, will be provided via the City grants webpage.

POLICY REVIEW AND AMENDMENTS

- This policy will be reviewed annually by the *Committee of the Whole* and amendments approved by Council as necessary to reflect continuous improvement.

Limited Duration 2 Year Operating Grant 2026 Guidelines

OBJECTIVE:

Objective: to provide funding for up to 2 years to registered not-for profits towards overall operating costs and are not designated for any specific project or activity. Applications are accepted once per year. Step 1 LOI due January 15th at 4:30pm; Step 2 full application (if invited) due January 31st at 4:30pm. Allocations are up to 30% of the organizations overall operating budget up to max of \$30,000. Organizations with an operating budget under \$250,000 are eligible to apply. Preference is to fund the full amount requested with an anticipated 5-7 applicants funded.

APPLY FOR

Up to 30% of operating budget, max \$30,000 per year (up to 2 yrs)

For example, if you apply for up to \$10,000 for 2026, you may be eligible to receive an additional \$10,000 in 2027 without needing to reapply, as part of a two-year funding term (paid annually)

2026 GRANT STREAM ALLOCATION

\$131,576

GRANT CRITERIA

This grant supports not-for-profit organizations that serve Prince George residents. We encourage applications from organizations whose mandate and/or activities directly aligns with the City's priorities and who actively work to advance these Grant Criteria within their organization.

NEW 2026

Grant Criteria (Focus Areas):

- A safe, healthy, and clean community
- Equity, diversity, inclusion, and accessibility

Other Grant Criteria Areas:

- Community pride
- Health and wellness
- Social connection
- Arts and culture participation
- Environmental sustainability and stewardship

Organizations whose mandates and/or activities align with the priority focus areas will be prioritized for funding. For example, an organization whose mandate includes improving accessibility, such as reducing barriers to participation, creating more inclusive spaces, or ensuring equitable access to programs and services for underserved or marginalized groups—would be aligned and therefore prioritized during adjudication over groups whose mandate aligns with the other grant criteria areas listed above.

ELIGIBILITY REQ.

- The applicant must be a registered not-for-profit society.
- Must have been in operation for at least two years.
- Must operate within Prince George for the benefit of residents.
- Must demonstrate a need for the requested funding. (organizations with large operating surpluses or access to significant unrestricted funding may be deprioritized).
- Applicants must demonstrate other sources of confirmed funding to ensure they are not reliant on this grant to sustain operations.

NEW 2026

- Must have an operating budget of less than \$250,000 (supporting smaller not-for-profits to build local capacity ensures a more equitable and diverse delivery of community services, strengthening overall community resilience)
- Must directly impact over 100 residents annually through programs or services
- Must offer programming and services on a daily, weekly, monthly, or seasonal basis (any one of these is acceptable)
- Must demonstrate partnership with at least one other organization on an ongoing basis
- Must NOT have a low-cost or subsidized lease agreement with the City of Prince George
- Must NOT have a Standing Grant Agreement

INELIGIBLE EXPENSES

- Payment of City Property Taxes
- Payment of debt
- Major capital purchases(e.g. land acquisition, buildings, vehicle purchases etc.)

FUNDING CONSIDERATIONS

Adjudication reviews applications using a scoring matrix based on overall alignment with the grant criteria and eligibility requirements. Additional considerations may include:

- Number of applications received
- Total amount requested from all applicants
- Budget available to allocate to all applications
- Preference is to fund the full amount requested with an anticipated 5-8 applicants funded

APPLICATION & REPORTING

Apply through City Website. Step 1 will be available on December 15th.

Step 1: Letter of Intent (LOI)

Intake deadline: January 15th at 4:30pm

- Registered Society Status confirmation
- Organization mandate or mission statement
- Annual Operating Budget Total
- How your organization aligns with grant criteria
- High level overview of funding need

Step 2: Full Application (based on approval of LOI)

Intake deadline: January 31st at 4:30pm

- Information about your organization (years of operation, number of staff, volunteers etc.)
- Information on your programs (target audience, number of participants, duration/frequency etc.)
- Description on partnerships
- Other sources of funding
- Budget on how you will allocate funding to support your organization
- Recent statement of financial (including balance sheet and statement of revenues & expenditures)
- Information on need for funding

Reporting including:

- Annual evaluation report
- Statement of financials
- May include request to present to Council

ADJUDICATION

Annual Grant Intake

- Intake Deadline: January 15th at 4:30pm for step 1 and January 31st at 4:30 for step 2
- Turnaround Time: 6-8 weeks
- Adjudication Team Composition:
 - Committee of the Whole (COTW)
 - Supported by administration (1-2 as non-voting members)

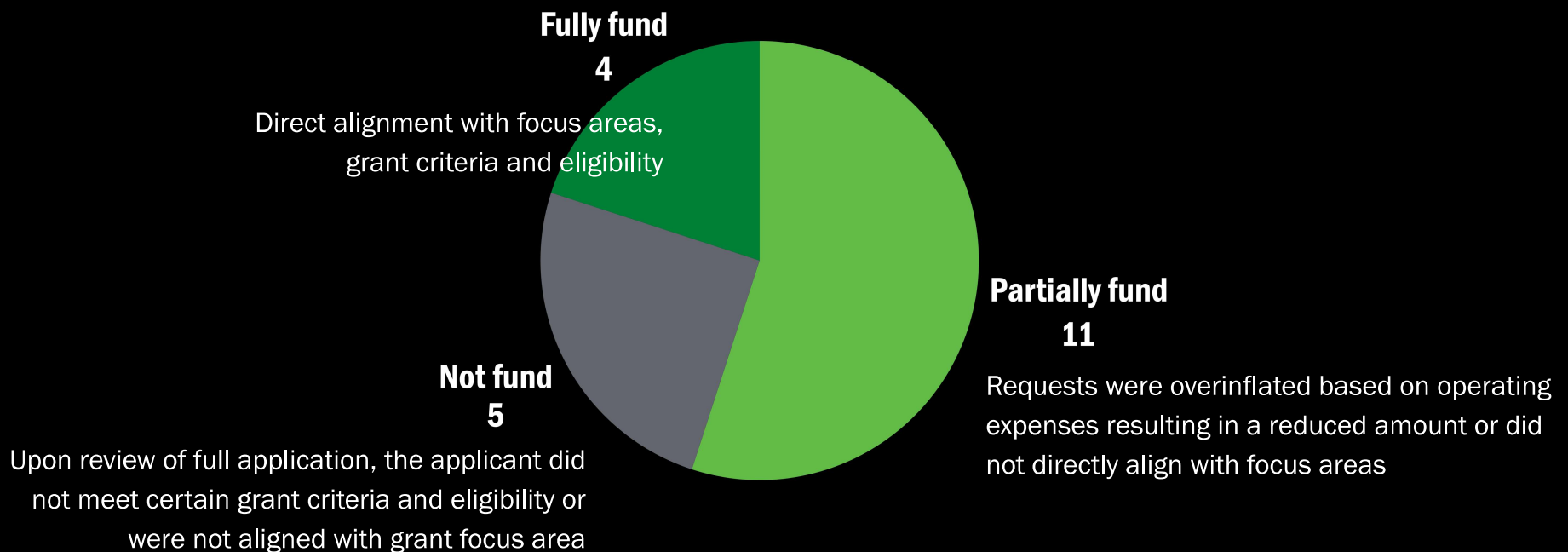

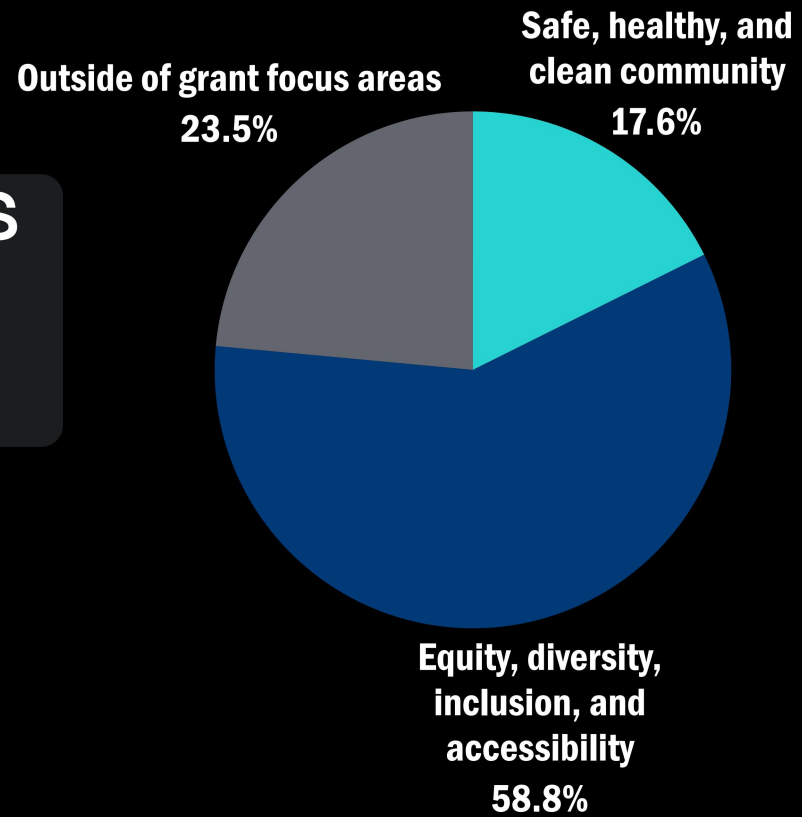

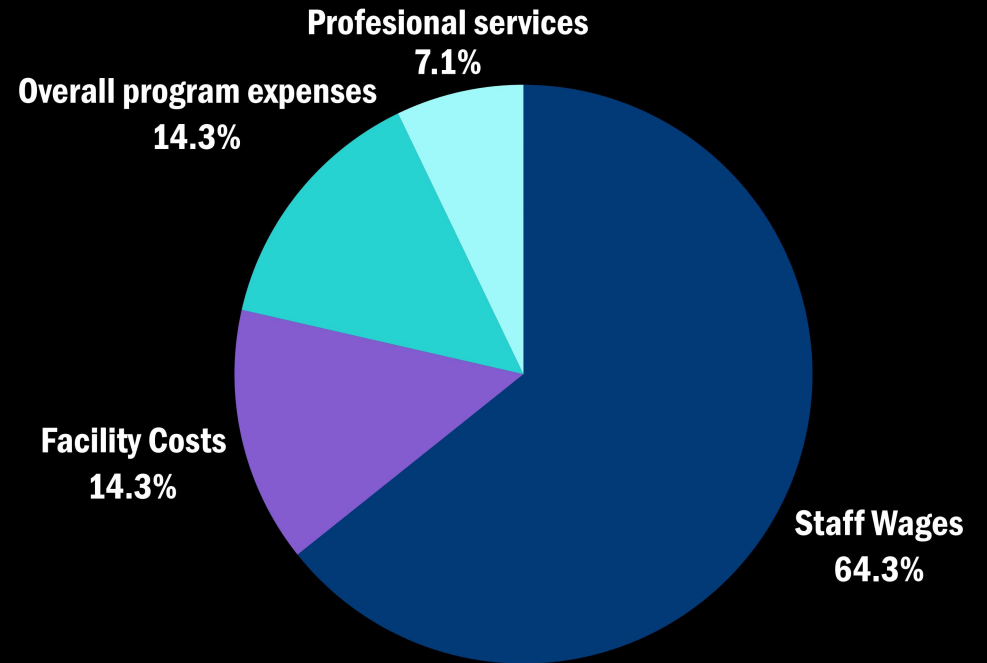
APPLICATIONS FUNDED VS. NOT FUNDED
